The Most Viewed Bills

H.R. 5515 (115th Congress) – John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2019 (Signed into law on August 13, 2018)

This bill authorizes FY2019 appropriations and sets forth policies for Department of Defense (DOD) programs and activities, including military personnel strengths. It does not provide budget authority, which is provided in subsequent appropriations legislation. The bill authorizes appropriations to DOD for: (1) Procurement, including aircraft, missiles, weapons and tracked combat vehicles, ammunition, shipbuilding and conversion, and space procurement; (2) Research, Development, Test, and Evaluation; (3) Operation and Maintenance; (4) Working Capital Funds; (5) Chemical Agents and Munitions Destruction; (6) Drug Interdiction and Counter-Drug Activities; (7) the Defense Inspector General; (8) the Defense Health Program; (9) the Armed Forces Retirement Home; (10) Overseas Contingency Operations; and (11) Military Construction.

The bill also authorizes the FY2019 personnel strength for active duty and reserve forces and sets forth policies regarding military personnel, acquisition policy and management, international programs, and National Guard and Reserve Forces facilities.

H.R. 5181 (114th Congress) – Countering Foreign Propaganda and Disinformation Act of 2016 (Introduced in the House May 16, 2016) https://www.congress.gov/bill/114th-congress/house-bill/5181 Foreign governments like China and especially Russia use disinformation and other propaganda tools to undermine the national security objectives of the United States and key allies and partners. The U.S. government should develop a comprehensive strategy to counter foreign disinformation and propaganda and assert leadership in developing a fact-based strategic narrative, an important element of which should be to promote an independent press in countries vulnerable to foreign disinformation.

H.R. 392 (115th Congress) – Fairness for High-Skilled Immigrants Act of 2017 (Introduced in the House on January 10, 2017)

This proposal basically calls for the augmentation of the number of immigrants from countries that have reached their limit. Those wishing a visa can apply to enter the U.S., if those persons wishing to immigrate have skills to offer and sponsors. H.R. 6147 (115th Congress) - Interior, Financial Services and General Government, Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Transportation, Housing and Urban Development Appropriations Act, 2019 (Introduced in the House on June 19, 2018) This bill, which has passed in the House and the Senate, is awaiting approval by the President; it appropriates sums of money to various agencies for necessary expenses.
