I feel very thankful to live and work in a community that supports its local library. This year, we opened a new branch on Stamford's West Side in the Police Activities League Center. This wouldn't have been possible without stable support from the City of Stamford. There are so many support services we provide that go beyond basic library service thanks to the generosity of this community. For example, we
