Message from the CEO



Several years ago, the Ferguson Library received a generous donation in memory of long-time volunteer Harry Bloch. Knowing how Mr. Bloch loved history, the donor wanted to underwrite a program that would bring history alive for youth. This year's Harry Bloch Family History Program will do just that. Our guest speaker, Andrew Aydin, is a *New York Times* bestselling author, National Book Award winner, Robert F. Kennedy Book Award

Honoree, Printz Award winner, and I could go on.

Andrew is the creator and co-author of the graphic memoir series *March*, which chronicled the life of Congressman and civil rights icon John Lewis. When I saw Andrew Aydin speak about *March* and the sequel *Run: Book One*, I felt as if I were part of the civil rights movement. I encourage you to attend this virtual program, talk about the issues raised, then read *Run*. It will be available at our Back-to-School Book Giveaway, which begins September 18 at all our locations.

Ferguson Receives Federal Grant to Enhance Service

The Ferguson Library has received a \$31,000 grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services to enhance access to library services. Part of the money will be used to purchase an annual service plan for the 25 hotspots that the library circulates to people in need of internet access (the current plan, purchased with state funding, is expiring). People can also borrow Chromebooks from the library.

Additional funding will be used to purchase self-check kiosks for the South End Branch and digital lockers for the Harry Bennett Branch. These will be situated outside so people can pick up materials even when the library is closed. We also plan to purchase air-purifying machines for small study rooms and meeting spaces, so those spaces can be safely used by the public.
