Howard Kaplan Memorial Lecture on Law and Society

Associate Justice Andrew J. McDonald of the Connecticut Supreme Court will deliver the inaugural Howard Kaplan Memorial Lecture on Law and Society Tuesday, November 9 at 6:30 p.m. at the Main Library.

Justice McDonald will discuss state government from his unique perspective of serving in all three branches. The lecture is the first of a series supported by the Stamford law firm Wofsey, Rosen, Kweskin and Kuriansky and the family of the late Howard Kaplan. Kaplan, who was a long-time partner at the firm, also served on the Stamford Board of Representatives, and was a founding member of the Stamford Board of Ethics, president of the Stamford Child Care Center, and director and counsel to the Stamford Land Conservation Trust. The lecture is free and open to the public. Registration is required.
