October 4 to 8 is National Digital Inclusion Week, which focuses on the need for digital equity nationwide. What does that mean? Imagine that you are looking to renew your driver's license and not only do you not have internet access, but you don't have an email address to make an appointment. Where do you begin? Or your neighborhood was hit hard by Ida and you have to report the damage to the city's website. Not having access to the

internet or necessary digital literacy skills impacts quality of life, whether it is making that appointment or connecting with a loved one during the pandemic.

We just received a grant through the Connecticut State Library to hire digital navigators. It is a pilot program based on the work done by the Salt Lake City Library that will allow us to go into the community to work with people on digital skills and even provide some equipment. We are very excited about this project, and look forward to working towards digital inclusion for our entire community.



Ferguson Library Welcomes New Trustees

The Ferguson Library Board of Trustees has elected Stephanie O'Shea as its new chair for 2021-2022. She succeeds outgoing chair Anderson Livingston.

Ms. O'Shea has had a long career in the publishing industry, most recently working as Senior Account Manager for John Wiley & Sons. She is deeply involved in the Stamford community. In addition to serving as a Ferguson Library Trustee, she has served on the



Stamford Democratic City Committee and was a Board of Education write-in candidate in 2020. Ms. O'Shea is also a member of the Stamford School District's CORE Reopening Committee, and the Long-Term Facilities Committee and its Steering Committee. She is a past president of the Stamford Parent-Teacher Council.

Michael Hyman will serve as the board's vice-chair; Sopong Kim continues as treasurer and Robert J. Granata as secretary. Pastchair Anderson Livingston, whose term has expired, leaves the board; Tamu Lucero and R.J. Mercede join the board.

Ferguson Library Awarded a **Connecticut State Library Grant**

The Ferguson Library has been awarded a \$96,000 Connecticut State Library grant underwritten by American Rescue Plan Act funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services to support the creation of a Digital Navigators program in Stamford.

The program will allow us to hire three digital navigators, who will identify clients without adequate connectivity and offer them instruction and/or digital devices. The project will operate in partnership with the City of Stamford, SilverSource, Stamford Interfaith Refugee Settlement, Islamic Cultural Center of New York (Stamford chapter), Stamford Public Education Foundation, and Building One Community.
